### What your application should show

- Interesting extracurricular activities
- Challenging summer jobs and activities
- Excellent college essays
- Honest and detailed letters of recommendation
- Challenging classes attempted

# How to Apply?

There is no one specific way to apply to colleges/universities; many schools use different application types

- Common Application
- Coalition Application
- Institutional Applications

### Common Application

#### www.commonapp.org

- More than 700 colleges and universities to apply to
- One centered place to complete applications
- Schools can upload information
- Recommenders can input their recommendations on to the website



### Coalition Application

#### www.coalitionforcollegeaccess.org

- Applications are more holistic
- Students can create accounts starting in the 9th grade
  - "Lockers" where students building their portfolios
- Less universities
- Recommenders can upload their recommendations on to the website



### Institutional Applications

- These vary based on the institution of application
  - Be sure to:
    - Look at all requirements necessary for each university/college
    - GPA
    - SAT/ACT Scores
    - Resume
    - Cost of application (waivers if applicable)
    - Letters of recommendation
    - Personal Statements and essays
    - Portfolios (if applicable)

### Registering for the SATs/ACTs

- A breakdown of how students perform with standardized testing
  - Some universities are moving away from this practice and don't require these
- Register for the SATs through <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>
- Register for ACTs through <u>www.act.org</u>
- Costs may vary based on exam
  - SAT \$46 (with essay \$60)
  - ACT \$46 (with essay \$62.50)

### SAT vs ACT

#### SAT

- Tests in areas of critical reading and math
- More sections with shorter time periods
- Sections alternate between subjects
- More emphasis on vocabulary
- Math covers algebra, geometry, and algebra 2
- Score given in sections and as a composite

#### ACT

- Less sections but longer time periods
- Includes a science section in addition to math, and reading
- Less vocabulary emphasis
- Math covers up through trigonometry
- Score given in sections and as a composite





### Choosing your schools

- Some factors to consider:
  - GPA
  - Course history
  - SAT/ACT scores
  - Intended major
  - Location
  - Size of school/classes
  - 4 year graduation rate and 1<sup>st</sup> year retention rate
  - Financial aid package (average package, % need met)
  - Post college graduation placement (jobs, grad school admissions)

# Ranking

When building a list of schools for your child to apply to consider:

- Reach school: Dream school
- **Target school:** The potential perfect fit
- Safety school: Students qualifications exceed the average

#### Parent To-Do:

- 1. Parent Consent for Transcript Release

# Transcript Package

Each transcript package will include:

- Official transcript
- Edison High School Profile and Fairfax County Public School Profile
- Secondary School Report from Counselor
- Mid-year grades will be sent in February no additional requests are needed
- Final senior grades will be sent in June based on senior survey answers no additional requests are needed
